





DIRECTOR'S NOTES

This play has been on my list of "to direct" since I first heard of it in March of 2017. The playwright Bryna Turner, an alum of Mount Holyoke, took the letters written by Woolley and Marks and created this play. Turner describes their play as "an excavation of queer history, a history that has been buried and hidden and kept from us. It's also a queering of history, a look at past events through a contemporary gaze." The story of these two women, Mary Emma Woolley and Jeannette Augustus Marks, has been lost to time and history due to their relationship and because they were women. I am happy and honored to have worked with this talented company to bring the story of Woolley and Marks to life.

Bull in a China Shop is my kind of play. It has women speaking not about men, but speaking up for themselves, with agency and purpose. They are speaking of love, change, power and equality. This is a play that fights the patriarchy, has women in academia, it is a period play with so much anachronism and contemporary language that it fuses all of these things together. It is poetic one moment, full of imagery and beauty, and then it is forcing you to sit up and take notice of the inequality that is occurring - not just then but now. There are moments that will hopefully make you laugh, moments where you will want to fight with these characters, and moments where the language is so powerful and demanding that you will feel the urge for change.

Bull in a China Shop is a revolution of change. A revolution in love, education, equality, ideals, power, and gender. While I admire the women of this play, I adore Woolley and Marks and their relationship. Their complex, messy, passionate, meaningful and beautiful relationship. While they are attached to the other, they are still very much an individual navigating a world that doesn't seem ready for them. Now, through the fantastic and talented words of Bryna Turner, I hope the world sees just how amazing Woolley and Marks are, and how they brought about change. They are a revolution and a revelation.






This production is entered in the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF). The aims of this national theater education program are to identify and promote quality in college-level theater production. To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels.


Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
